Zoning Change Clears Way for Sale of Old Museum and Creation of New Exhibits

B CHS Trustees have been working for over a year to pave the way for the sale of our old museum building. We voted to sell the building because we did not plan to continue to operate a museum at that location, could not continue the expense and

liability of maintaining two buildings, and we needed the proceeds to fund exhibit installation in our new museum.

Getting a clear title to our property posed several challenges. Multiple surveys of the property did not agree, including two surveys by the same surveyor. We found that a portion of our building was protruding on City property, which was marked as an extension of Austin St and on Main St. A review of old maps and the Bird's Eye View revealed the protrusion occurred as early as 1887. After several negotiation sessions, BCHS agreed to accept the City's survey and the City agreed to vacate that portion of Austin St. and to sell us the portion of the property upon which we protruded, approximately 2,784 square feet for \$5,600. We also agreed to give the City an easement to the river walk.

Zoning posed an additional challenge. In 1991, our property had been marked on the City zoning map as Parkland. The property was not

intended to be a park and had been operating as a museum, which falls under Office zoning designation. There are no requirements or regulations outlined for a Parkland designation, so we had no guidance as to how to address development and use issues related our property. The City recommended and requested a zoning change from Parkland to Office. Planning and Zoning passed the ordinance to vacate Austin St. and the zoning change on both properties by a 5-2 vote. The City Council passed it unanimously on the first reading, and by a 4-1 vote on the second reading. The issue was not without controversy. A neighbor was concerned that a change in zoning would negatively affect her property value and a member of P&Z brought up concerns about Historic preservation. Several erroneously assumed that our property was part of the park. It has been private property since the 1880s and our museum since 1952.

We have worked diligently in the past to make certain that the historic part of our former museum, an old house which comprises less than a one-third of the building would be preserved by obtaining three historic designations: National Register of Historic Places, Texas Historic Commission Marker, and the Bastrop Historic Landmark. The local designation has restrictions and significant fines that prohibit demolition or modification of a building to the extent that it no longer meets the historical designation. The portion of our lot that could be built upon is less than a quarter of an acre due to the steep drop off to the river of our lot, in fact, that was the reason we could not expand at our current location. We plan to close on the sale of the property later this month. Our buyer has assured us that he will abide with all ordinances of the City and will uphold all of the preservation designations that exist on the property. It is our understanding that he intends to improve the building, and its use will be in full compliance all city codes and ordinances.

With the sale we will have the funding we need to build out most of our exhibits in the first exhibit gallery in the new museum. Our first exhibit was The Colorado River opening on January 26th. Next we will install El Camino Real by the end of June. It will be followed by a Timeline Exhibit, the Lost Pines Exhibit and a combination Baron de Bastrop/Stephen F. Austin Exhibit which we hope to have in place by the end of this year. We will need to continue to raise funds and will be looking for exhibit sponsors for Historic Homes, Settlers, Fight for Independence, Cotton, Cattle, Coal, World War II/Camp Swift exhibits to be installed next year in the Maynard room.

Visitor Center to Feature Digital Signage

During this 60-day trial period, visitor center staff will develop presentations to promote Bastrop and to publicize upcoming events. The monitor also allows for a scrolling list of BCHS Business Members.

FourWinds, our vendor, has 300 clients playing on 100,000 displays around the world including the Courtyard Marriott, Apache Oil, plus many airports and universities.

What we can learn to do will propel us into a new realm of communications at our new facility. Furthermore, BCHS can take pride in being the first local organization outside City Hall to be running the digital signage.

On January 26, a crowd of approximately 300 people were on hand for the Ribbon Cutting for the new Museum and Visitor Center and for the Historical Society's first exhibit, The Colorado River. This first-class exhibit focuses on the river and its contribution to Bastrop's history, economy, and recreation.




Funding for the exhibit was

provided, in part, by a grant from the Community Development Partnership Program of the Lower Colorado River Authority. The LCRA granted \$25,000 toward the project, which had a total project cost of \$42,000. The remaining funds were provided through the generosity of individuals and businesses. LCRA also provided photographs and film of historic floods for use in a new educational video which is a major feature of the exhibit.

The new exhibit compliments the City of Bastrop's efforts to focus on the River and invites visitors to complete their river experience by taking a stroll on the June Pape River Walk which is located immediately behind the museum.

Stop by the new gift shop in the Visitor Center at 904 Main St. The gift shop is selling two beautiful, informative books which feature the River: *Born of the River* by Turk Pipkin, which sells for \$25 and *River of Contrasts*, *The Texas Colorado* by Margie Crisp, which sells for \$29.

The Life and Death of Davy Crockett

Join us at the next BCHS Quarterly Meeting, Thursday, April 25, 2013, at Bluebonnet Headquarters. Our speaker, William (Bill) Gronemann III, the author of David Crockett, Hero of the Common Man, will discuss interesting aspects of the life and death of David Crockett. Come and hear about the myths and realities surrounding Texas' legendary hero from a long-time student of the Battle of the Alamo, who has written a number of books and articles exploring its history and the questions surrounding the death of Crockett.

William Gronemann III was born and raised in New York City. He is a former member of the New York City Fire Department having served in the ranks of Firefighter, Fire Marshal, Lieutenant, and Captain. He responded to the World Trade Center, on September 11, 2001, while off-duty, arriving with his men from Engine Company 308 about 1½ hours after the towers collapsed. He retired in February 2002 after a 25-year career.

Among his other books include *Death of a Legend*, *Eyewitness to the Alamo – Revised Edition*, and the most recently published, *September 11: A Memoir*. He is a member (and former board member) of the Western Writers of America, a member of the Alamo Society, and also a member of the John Steinbeck Society.
